

SUSTAINING HISTORIC GARDENS in time of Climate Stress

Dr Tim Entwhisle of Melbourne's Royal Botanic Gardens spoke at a recent Garden History conference in Hobart and outlined the Gardens' plan for the time not so far ahead, when the climate of Melbourne will be more like that of Dubbo. Its plan included gradual change to planting drier and more heat tolerant species, and moving the Rhododendron collection to the higher altitude of the Dandenongs.

Eryldene is a specialist garden that has the responsibility of sustaining Waterhouse's camellia and azalea collection in situ. In light of this responsibility, we are working to make the garden more resilient to changing climatic conditions, and identifying what we need to do in terms of horticultural management and our organisational carbon footprint.

Our thanks to Emma Bonbonato from the Sydney Opera House and Trustees Bruce Walker, Helen Wallace and Sheridan Burke for developing Eryldene's first Environmental Action Plan, researching just what has changed for Eryldene, and developing an important register of our climate risks and initiatives to implement.

In March we will be hosting an international webinar to link up with historic gardens interstate and in the UK and USA to discuss ways of sustainably maintaining heritage gardens which, like Eryldene, cannot switch to 'hardier' plant material to survive without losing integrity and significance found in the plantings, the form and textural composition which make them so special.

Special thanks also to Trustee Wendy Dellit, who with Honorary Architect Bob Moore created our first comprehensive maintenance plan, enabling us to schedule and budget for catch-up repairs, which we look forward to implementing in the new year--La Nina and our specialist tradesmen willing.
